

Persuade the Senate to Restore Child Care for American Families!

There was good news last month when the House passed the President's Build Back Better Bill, which will, if the Senate agrees, restore child care and other Government support for young children and their families to something better than our pre-COVID levels. But our/your Senators are still struggling to convince a few reluctant holdouts to muster a majority to pass the Bill. Now, more than ever, they need your calls (to (202) 224-3121), e-mails, letters, and visits (at their home offices or in DC), to convince them to make a deal and move on, so that President Biden can sign the Bill and start to restore child care, etc. Please help now! And thanks much for your daily efforts to keep children safe and engaged.

Repeal the President's Authority to Wage Undeclared War & Other Pentagon Waste!

Every year Congress passes a Bill to give the Pentagon mostly a blank check to defend the country. This year's Bill, already passed by the House, has a provision of interest to those of us who want peace. It repeals an authorization, given to the President almost 20 years ago, to wage war without having Congress exercise its Constitutional right and duty to Declare War. Several Presidents have misused that authority, including the wanton killing of unarmed women and children in Syria, so we support that part of the Bill.

In addition, during the Senate debate amendments are likely to be introduced to reduce the bloated budget for failed defensive systems and for unnecessary modernization of nuclear weapons. Please contact your Senators to ask them to support the repeal of the President's Authorized Use of Military Force, and to cut the wasteful and harmful bloated Pentagon expense proposals.

Support Kids Privacy Act, HR 4801

Our friends at <u>Fairplay</u> have alerted us to the Bill now in the House of Representatives, to extend the protections of privacy under current law to adolescents ages 13-17, prohibit surveillance advertising and other harmful uses of data on sites likely to be used by children, and require companies to consider the best interests of young people when designing their platforms, and to conduct risk assessments to determine potential harms of them to children and teens. Please ask your Representative to support this Bill.

Please Get Vaccinated ASAP!



It's good for your health, it's good for the health of the children in your care, and it's good for their families too. The more eligible people we can get vaccinated, the easier it will be for life to return to normal for all of us. Kids from the ages of 5 to 11 are now eligible for vaccinations.


International Children's Peace Prize 2021 Recipients Vihaan (17) and Nav (14) Agarwal

Two brothers have won this year's *International Children's Peace Prize* award. Vihaan and Nav Agarwal started an organization in their hometown of Delhi, called *One Step Greener*. While growing up in this city, the brothers often were not able to play outside due to the bad land as well as air pollution. Growing up with asthma, they started this initiative to organize waste pickup drives, in order to make the city cleaner (Kidsrights.org, 2021). *One Step Greener* has now become an organization that collects waste from over 1000 households city-wide and partakes in the recycling process to reduce the amount of waste that reaches the landfills. <u>Read more on this story...</u>




PEACE Interest Forum & Meeting participants, NAEYC Conference 2021




She brings together peace and her love for nature

Book Reviews



Chicken Soup for the Soul Babies: Everyone Shares (Except Cat) Jamie Michalak (Author), Katie Mazeika (Illustrator), Charlesbridge, 2021 [Board book, 24 pages]

Chicken Soup for the Soul Babies series imparts good values through heartwarming and humorous storylines to help kids navigate their world.

Everyone Shares (Except Cat), book presents a gentle rhyming text with five young animals sharing a variety of objects and experiences:


"Mouse shares with Bear. Dog shares the rug. Duck shares a chair. Bear shares a hug."

Cat is a charming grouchy character. All the animals at the playground like to share, all except Cat. Why won't Cat share the seesaw? Maybe he can be convinced to give it a try? Cat refuses to share the seesaw when the other animals want to play, but learns that this is the wrong item to control by yourself. Maybe sharing can be even more fun than being the boss. Cat eventually understands the rules of sharing.

The message about sharing is simple and relatable for toddlers/young pre-K and the teachings are easy to grasp. There is enough humor to keep it fun and light while still being meaningful.

Chicken Soup for the Soul Babies: Everyone Says Please (Except Cat) Jamie Michalak (Author), Katie Mazeika (Illustrator), Charlesbridge, 2021

This book reflects concerns about Cat's refusal to say the 'magic word'. The animal characters from the first book act as series players and acknowledge that saying please gets them what they want and need. Toddlers may relate to the epic temper tantrum that Cat throws midway through this story. It is only when Cat sees Mouse say the 'magic word' to Mama cat and copies this action that the kitty finally gets the desired cheese.



Valuable information of these "life lessons" are included at the end of the books for caregivers. For example, "Teach your toddler to notice the color of people's eyes so that they can practice making eye contact." Children will enjoy watching Cat work out his 'bad behavior'. Sweet and silly, *Chicken Soup for the Soul Babies* make lessons easy and fun for the littlest learners. Young ones often learn manners when they are the object of impoliteness, they can reason the value of good manners such as sharing. Cat does not share and your child will see the injustice of this.

Both *Chicken Soup for the Soul Babies* titles feature bright paintings of toddler-shaped animals. The illustrations are vivid, detailed, adorable and child friendly. The artwork helps a child see the value of good manners. Both books could be fun in a one-on-one or small group reading, to talk about what the young reader actually observes. Also, used at a circle time, each book could prompt useful discussions. I believe these board books are a solid addition to a home library!

December 1 - International Prisoners for Peace Day

December 1st is dedicated to the Prisoners for Peace Day. For over 60 years, War Resisters' International (of which P.E.A.C.E. is an associate member) have on this day, announced the stories and names of those imprisoned because of their actions for peace. With the goal of refusing to join the military, many are conscientious objectors. Others have taken nonviolent actions to disrupt preparation for war.

This day provides a great opportunity for you to demonstrate your support for those individuals and their movements, by <u>writing to those whose freedom has been taken</u> <u>away from them because of their work for peace.</u>

December 3 - International Day of Persons with Disabilities



The International Day of Disabled Persons was established in 1992 by the United Nations. This day has become an annual observance day to celebrate and support the rights and well-being of people with disabilities, to raise awareness when thinking about political, social, economic and cultural life involvement.

In 2006, the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities was adopted, after many years of UN's work in the field of disability. This convention has furthered the rights and well-being for people with disabilities, through the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and other international development frameworks,

such as the Charter on Inclusion of Persons with Disabilities in Humanitarian Action.

On December 21st, the shortest day of the year, the Hopi and Zuni Indians celebrate Soyal: a winter solstice ceremony, *The Peaceful Ones*. This ceremonial ritual is intended to bring the sun back from its long winters.

Per the website, this ceremony is celebrated over a period of 16 days which starts with prayers and supplications and ends with a feast and Kachina Dance. The Native American name for this important ceremony is 'Soyalangwul' from which the term 'Soyal' is derived.


December 26 to January 1 - Kwanzaa
