Report from the P.E.A.C.E. Retreat, June 2022

P.E.A.C.E, members met in person, and digitally, at the Mercy Center, Auburn CA, for our annual Retreat. The agenda covered a variety of topics over a day and a half.

We decided that our annual meeting for all members should continue to be held at the NAEYC Conference each year. It had been proposed to move it to the June Retreat, but our hope is that we will have more participation at the conference in person and add Zoom coverage to increase the number who can attend.

This Year's conference will be held in Washington DC from Nov. 16 to 18. Watch for the announcement of the date and timing of our annual meeting. A Committee has been formed to plan the meeting and other Conference activities.

We also deliberated and chose 2022 Peace Awardees: Hannah Thompson, Josh Golin, of FairPlay, and, we hope, an indigenous group who create educational materials on native topics for Minnesota schools. The awards will be presented at the annual meeting.

A decision was confirmed to provide the newsletter on the website in its complete form. A monthly notice sent to members by Mailchimp in an email will include a list of the contents, and a link will take members to the website.

Fran Roznowski announced that she is willing to continue in the treasurer's role in its new limited capacity. She will oversee the member of the Book Keepers Collaborative who is being hired to keep our monthly records and meet other formal financial needs. The address for P.E.A.C.E will not change at this time.

We will meet again next year for the Retreat at the Mercy Center and share the time from June 16–19, 2023 with Educators for Peaceful Classrooms and Communities, EPCC, as we did this year.

The Peace Projects played an important role at the Retreat. The reports from each of the six projects were shared. They provided a fine window into the work that the programs had accomplished this spring. We look forward to more inspiration from future projects and hope you will follow the accounts of the 2022 efforts as they appear month by month in the newsletters to come. Please also consider becoming a project leader or sponsor for the next round of awards coming this fall.

When I first joined CEASE in the mid-

1980's there was always **Boone Schirmer** (a.k.a. Peggy's husband). He held an amazing presence. He told stories of the McCarthy era and being underground in Roxbury, Massachusetts. He was very active in the demilitarization of Okinawa and the Pacific



Islands. Every year at the CEASE retreat he would give the annual talk to the 20 or so attendees in summer shorts and t-shirts in Truro (Massachusetts) on the state of the US Military and its effects on children, families, and the world! He only showed aggression when he chased the squirrels away from the bird feeder. He was funny, present, and committed to CEASE and the world.

Frank Petrocelli and Heidi Smith used to come regularly to retreats before and during the birth of their two sons. Frank was our CEASE lawyer, straightening out our bylaws, and Heidi an infant toddler coordinator in Boston. It was always a joy to have Frank at these meetings with his joyful spirit and charismatic smile. We

lost him to ALS way too soon. They both gave us so much.


Poetry

Book Review



Mommy's Hometown

Hope Lim, author Jaime Kim, illustrator Candlewick, 2022. Preschool – Gr2


This summer I am sharing a new uplifting, intergenerational family tale inspired by the author's visit to her childhood home in Korea.

Mommy spends time sharing her stories of growing up with her young son. Her vivid stories have let the boy visit her homeland in his thoughts and dreams "At night, Mommy would tell me about where she grew up." She gives details of the

adventures and games she shared with her family and friends. Fortunately, they have an opportunity to travel to Mommy's hometown to visit her mother.

Hope Lim wants the readers to imagine how over time her hometown has changed while some things have stayed the same. "Everything is different from her stories." Seeking the differences is part of the visit to Mom's hometown as is finding and sharing a piece of her childhood in the modern landscape. Mom helps her son appreciate the stories they have shared.

A misinterpretation can happen between a parent's memories of a place and the current reality. The young son is confused about the changes that he witnesses. Where she described a village along a river, surrounded by mountains, now there are paved roads, concrete sidewalks and the skyscrapers block their view. He feels a connection with his mom and her memories, and discovers that even though time brings change, the important things can still be present, especially in the spirit of community and family. "I imagine Mommy playing as a girl under the red sky. And I am there, too."



The story unfolds to a child's-eye view, honors the immigrant experience and the timeless bond between parent and child. The urban progress doesn't mean they can't enjoy their time together as they explore her hometown creating new stories.

Jaime Kim's digital illustrations with the deep color backgrounds enhance the text showing the differences between the new and nostalgic.

The book is universal even while the story has a uniquely Korean setting. Readers will have a rich discussion on connections between generations and how towns develop and expand. Can you go home again? What is the meaning of home? Maybe going home again can never be exactly as you remember.

Hope Lim, the author of *I Am a Bird*, was born and raised in South Korea. She now lives with her family in San Francisco.

Jaime Kim was born and raised in Korea before moving to the US at the age of eighteen. Her books include *La La La: A Story of Hope* by Kate DiCamillo. She currently lives in North Carolina.
