

I hope that their families find peace and I hope only but the best for their healing. While I am saddened by this event, I also am extremely angered by the news of it. I am angry at our nation's leaders for continuing to let gun violence and school shootings occur due to their lack of efforts to make any changes. We have had gun laws on the table waiting to be voted on for years, yet they are cast aside and forgotten. Gun laws in our country are not consistent nor are they

effective in the sense that they allow for individuals to own guns who should not be allowed to own them. As a senior in high school, I have been participating in lockdown drills since elementary school, and it is unsettling to think that instead of working towards solving the issue at hand we are instead only focusing on preventive measures. Arming teachers, teaching about lockdowns, etc. — all these methods are only preventive and do nothing to work toward eliminating gun violence. Unless changes are made on a systemic level, shootings and violence caused by guns will only continue to occur. It is crucial that we continue to contact our legislators, urging them to make changes instead of idly watching as the same chain of events will continue occurring. This is beyond politics; this is about working toward a better and safer future for our country's children and educators.

Action Alert

New Child Care Proposal Going Forward

Senators Murray (WA) and Kaine (VA) have put forward a <u>new proposal</u> as part of a bipartisan Budget Reconciliation Bill, that would triple Federal child care subsidies under the CCDBG, add grants to open new child care centers, increase child care pay, and fund quality improvements, as well as piloting expansion grants to raise family income limits and cap family child care expenses at 7% of income, on a sliding scale. The proposal also would increase state preschool grants and raise Head Start salaries. This proposal should be coming up soon in the Senate. Please contact your Senators' offices at (202) 224-3121 to express your support, letting them know about the troubles you, your childcare colleagues, and the families you serve and can't serve have been having.

The proposal would give good care for more than a million new children, according to a <u>recent study</u>. In addition, a <u>recent poll</u> in seven Senate battleground states found support for the proposal by 66 percent of the likely voters, outranking other budget alternatives.


Little Gems 2022

Book Review



Nigel and the Moon

Antwan Eady, author Gracey Zhang, illustrator Harper Collins, 2022.

This is a timely tale of learning how to 'Dream Big' and demonstrate courage and confidence. Each night when Nigel looks up at the moon, his future is bright.

He imagines himself as an astronaut, AND a dancer, AND a superhero. The radiant art is done with bold brushstrokes and saturated colors of ink, gouache, and watercolors.



During the day Nigel is shy about sharing his dreams and displays a worried face. At school, it is 'Career Week' and Nigel still can't find the courage to share his dreams with his classmates. It's just easier to whisper his ideas to the moon. "What if I wish to be too many things?" He tells the moon "My parents don't have fancy jobs. Will my class laugh if I tell them?" His parents may not have "fancy jobs" — Mom delivers mail and Dad drives a truck — but they are very supportive of Nigel and his dreams. Coming to speak to his class, they highlight the value of their jobs, and confess that parenting Nigel is "the best job we've ever had."



Readers of all ages may empathize and see their own anxious experiences within this book. Nigel does find the courage to share his true self, a quiet power.

Educators could facilitate an endless discussion surrounding pride related to jobs within their community and direct awareness for any person that has ever held dreams close to their hearts, whispered them to the sky, and has made them real.
