

Please Keep Up the Pressure for Decent Early Childhood Funding!

Congress is still dithering about Federal Budget Issues, now involved in a Budget Reconciliation Bill. Child Care is in a promising, mostly favorable position in these negotiations. Your Senators, particularly, need to hear about your own difficulties, and the issues faced by the parents that are using or can't afford to use your services. We need to nudge Senators particularly toward prioritizing Child Care Funding now. Please call (202) 224-2131, and ask to speak to your Senator's office, then their Budget staff. Thanks!



Book Review

The Boy with Flowers in His Hair




The Boy with Flowers in His Hair by Jarvis, author/illustrator, Candlewick, 2022. Ages 3–7

What better time of year to read and share this new book. In this unusual story, everyone likes David, the boy with flowers in his hair. "He's sweet and gentle", just like the colorful flowers on his head. David and his best friend [the story's narrator] always have a great time together, finding the good puddles, creating art, and making up songs.

One day David comes to school wearing a hat. "He was quiet. David was never quiet". Students, of many different ethnicities, don't think David is strange until the flowers start to fall out. Jarvis crafts a book about friendship, compassion, and acceptance. The story becomes an extended metaphor about how good friends can share the burden of bad times, perhaps illness or trauma, with examples of how to be a kind and true friend to a classmate who is struggling.

Once upbeat and talkative, David grows quiet, uninterested in play, and the flowers fall out of his head. He starts wearing the hat to cover his "twiggy, spiky," head. His loyal friend stays right by his side and begins crafting painted paper flowers for David's hair, and other children quickly join in.



Caregivers/educators will want to talk about empathy, kindness, differences, changes to people, respect, and equality. This is definitely a story that has to be read aloud and discussed with students. The whimsical art depicts a lively classroom, including someone who varies from the usual, has challenges, and triumphs. These beautiful digital illustrations are engaging and full of warmth.

<u>Jarvis</u> is a talented author, illustrator, animator, and designer from the U.K. Jarvis says, "The way I work is always visual. I will have an image or character in mind and I pull a story out of it. I doodle and doodle and doodle until I get it right."

May 15 - International Conscientious Objection Day

International Conscientious Objection Day takes place on May 15th every year, to raise awareness of those who resist war. Conscientious objectors are those who, for moral or religious reasons, refuse to participate in armed conflict or join the armed forces.

In March of this year, *War Resisters International*, which has been campaigning for the Right of Conscientious Objection and the ending of all war, published the following statement: Solidarity with all those nonviolently resisting the war in Ukraine. We would like to share the following message from their statement:

We call upon people everywhere to express their opposition to war in any way they consider it possible. From a single post on social media or a small symbolic action, to organizing or participating in a protest against the war, every action creates a mosaic of the war resistance throughout the world. STOP THE RUSSIAN INVASION IN UKRAINE! STOP THE NATO EXPANSION! STOP ALL THE WARS, INVASIONS AND OCCUPATIONS WORLDWIDE!
